MR. BROWN'S REPORT

From Mr. Brown's Room

"There is much anticipation for this year's basketball teams. The Senior teams are both experienced and hungry to climb back to the podium this year. For fans willing to take a drive down highway 201, they can see both teams in action in the Vita tournament on November 29-30." This was from last year's Newsletter. What a difference a year makes. I have often joked that we are a basketball academy, but this year we have been forced to become merely an academy of learning.

As we adapt to life in the Covid Era, it is easy to dwell on all the things that we can't do. As I tell my students, I prefer to look at the obstacle and see what other path I could take. For Spirit Week this year, our Student Council came up with a plan to still have fun and develop leadership while abiding by Covid regulations. My daughter Naomi has turned her extra time and energy toward Triathlon training at home. If basketball returns, she will be ready. If there is no basketball, she will have a great training base for Springtime.

One benefit I have seen this year is that I am healthier. I have been guilty in the past of coming to school with a cold or a cough. On any given day in years gone by, I may have 25% of my students coughing and sneezing their germs toward me at the front of the class. As a result, germs and illnesses may last months. This year,

students have been following proper hygiene, washing their hands, maintaining distance and using a mask when they can't distance. If they are sick, they are encouraged to stay home and get healthy. Students have adapted well and our hope is that if a case comes into our school from the community, the precautions our school is taking will prevent further spread. Usually the expression, "You're acting like a bunch of kids," is an insult, but if adults in our province acted like our kids, the spread of virus could slow right down.

Even though it was difficult last Spring being limited to online learning, there were some benefits. As a teacher, I often am required to travel to Altona for meetings. Since Covid, all staff have become accustomed to video conferencing, which has saved travel time and has made us much more efficient. In the classroom, even old teachers like Mr. Brown have learned to make better use of technology for communicating information and assignments with students. If a student is unable to come to class, they can attend through a video conference and receive their assignment or video link immediately.

In the high school, the students are split into two cohorts. As the parent of a grade 12 student, I have seen that there are disappointments that extra-curricular activities have been limited. However, I have also seen that there are some unexpected benefits as well. Coming to school every other day allows good contact time with teachers and provides an opportunity to have more efficient group discussion. On the off days, students are given an opportunity to develop their ability to work independently, which will help them prepare for college/university. The off days are also an opportunity to book appointments or to maintain health by recharging their batteries. If students are provided with some degree of structure and support from teachers and parents, this year's graduates could be much better prepared for life after high school.

I suppose I have always been an optimist in my outlook. A positive outlook is good for our mental health and helps us be aware of new opportunities. I encourage parents to lead by example and find the silver lining in this unusual school year. We may all find the opportunity to build better versions of ourselves.

I struggled to walk back to my mother, with my arms tightly grasping the books, and my body bent around them to make sure not even one would fall.

She looked down and saw me struggling to walk back over to her.

"Brooklyn, do you really want all those books to bring home?"

"Yes", I told my mother.

We walked up to the table where my auntie was sitting, and we told her that we wanted to pay for

the new books I had chosen. We handed her some money, and she handed us some money back.

We visited for a few minute's then it was time to leave, I still wanted to go to the pool, and we needed to go there before my cousin got picked up by her father. We did not know the exact time she was going to leave because her father needed to drive to my house from an event he was at.

We ran out to the car, but this time my mother was carrying my books in a bag that my auntie had given us. I got into the back of the car with my cousin. "We need to go home first to get towels and drop off these books", my mother informed us.

We drove into my yard and went down the long driveway. My mother got out of the car and told us that she was going to be back in a minute, then we would go to the pool.

Just as my mother was walking back to the car, my cousins father drove into our yard.

He told us that he was in a hurry to get back home for something, and my cousin needed to leave quickly. My mother walked up to us and explained that we would not be able to go to the pool that day.

I was very upset to hear that I would not be able to go the pool, I was looking forward to it all day long, and I had even made plans of what we were going to do at the pool.

I slowly sauntered back into my house with my head down, thinking about how fun the pool would have been.
That was the day I learned my lesson...
"Do not save the best for last".

A summary of "Long Road to Justice: The Viola Desmond Story" by Carissa Prevost

Viola Desmond was a Black woman who lived in Halifax in the 1940's. She trained to become a hairdresser in New York, Atlantic City, and Montreal. After she graduated, she set up her own beauty salon adjacent to her

husband's barber shop. She started to travel around the Maritimes to sell products and train women in hairdressing who couldn't get proper training because of their race, and to set up locations for her students.

On one of these trips, her car broke down in New Glasgow, Nova Scotia. Instead of waiting around in a hotel room for her car to get fixed, she decided to go see a movie. That movie theater was segregated. She asked for a downstairs ticket but got an upstairs one instead.

After she sat down, she was asked to move by an employee but refused. A little while later, the theater manager asked her to move. But she refused again and was forcibly removed by two police officers. She was then put on the back of a patrol car.

When she got to jail, she was told that she couldn't do anything but wait for her trial. Her trial proceeded 14 hours after her arrest and had a private prosecution instead of a public prosecution. Viola was charged with tax evasion and forced to pay a fine of \$20.

After the trial, she collected her car and drove back to Halifax. Once she got home, the Advancement of Colored People Association got her a lawyer.

The lawyer that she hired built a case to sue for damages but couldn't until they appealed her case. The lawyer appealed her case to the county and supreme courts, but they were both denied. Viola eventually left Nova Scotia. In 2010, she was awarded a free pardon by the government of Nova Scotia.




