It's Always a Good Time for a Snack

Owl Fruit and Peanut Butter Snack (2 crackers) from OnMyKidsPlate.com

You'll need:

- * 1 tablespoon peanut butter (or cream cheese)
- * 1 graham cracker sheet (2 squares)
- * 2 strawberries
- * ½ a banana
- * 4 candy eyes (or chocolate chips)

Instructions:

- * Spread a thin layer of peanut butter on crackers
- * Slice banana into 6 rounds, cutting two in half.
- * Add 2 banana rounds to each cracker. Top with candy eveballs.
- * The half rounds become the wings. Add to graham crackers.
- * Slice the tops off strawberries, then slice each strawberry in half longwise. Trim one piece a little shorter. The long slice becomes the belly and the short slice becomes the beak.

Owl Action Poem

A wise old owl sat in an oak, (cross arms and sit up tall)

Owl Paper Plate Craft

Supplies:

- 2 paper plates
- Brown paint
- Construction paper yellow, white, black and orange
- Scissors, glue and paintbrush

Instructions:

- Paint the paper plates brown and let dry.
- Cut construction paper circles 2 large yellow circles, 2 medium white circles and 2 small black circles.
- Glue white circles onto yellow circles and then black circles onto white circles to make the eyes.
- Cut one plate in half to make wings and trim the other to shape the ears. Glue the wings to the owl face.
- Glue eyes onto the owl face. Cut a triangle from the orange paper to make a nose and glue onto the face.



When you look at the features of owls, you will notice how many of these come in pairs. Owls have two eyes, a couple of wings and a pair of feet. Using different vocabulary words to point out things that come in twos is a good way to start to build math vocabulary. Noticing pairs on an owl can allow you to extend the conversation to other things that come in twos.

As you enjoy these cool autumn days, look around your environment and ask questions that help your child identify pairs, doubles and couples. The conversation can lead to things that go well together such as rakes and leaves, hay and scarecrows or squirrels and acorns.
